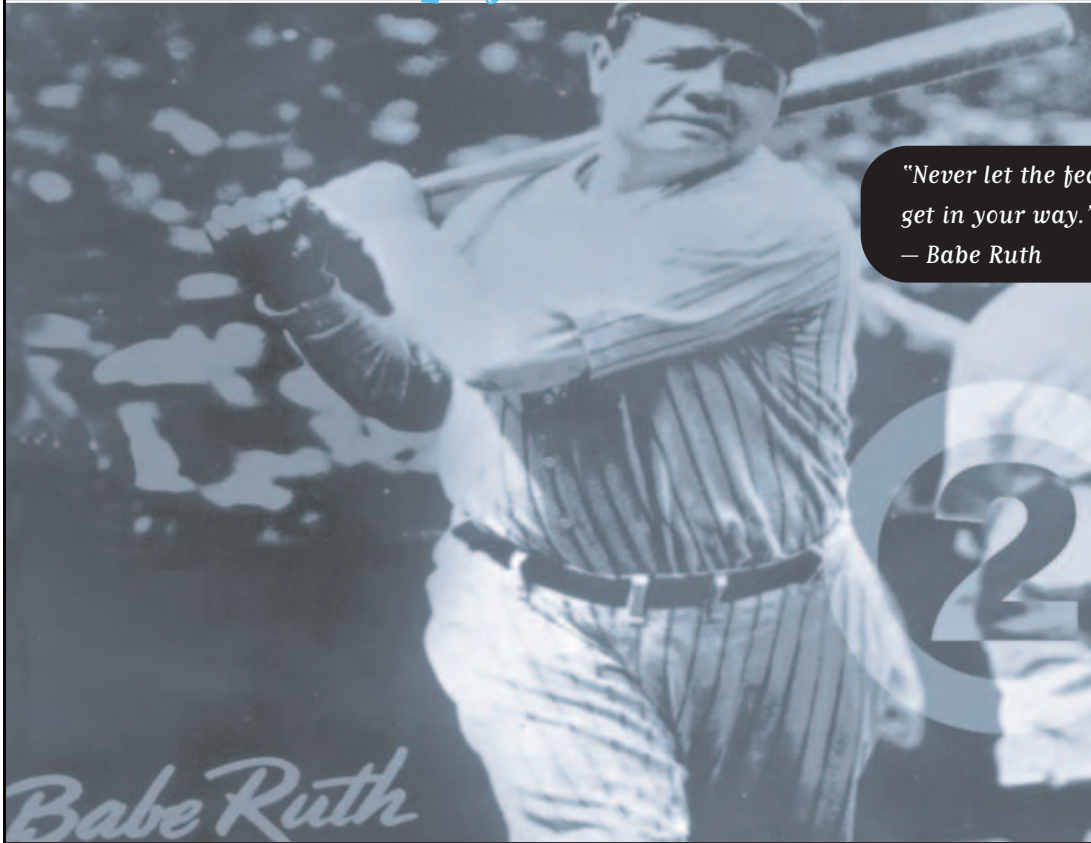


Creativity flourishes when it's okay to make **MISTEAKS.**



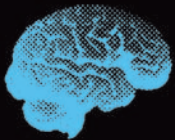
"Never let the fear of striking out get in your way."
